Charity of the Quarter

For November/December/January, the PCC has chosen Ripple Africa (www.rippleafrica.org) as our charity.

RIPPLE Africa is a charity working in Malawi. It was started by Geoff and Liz Furber in 2003 and now has over 150 Malawian staff. The charity works with local communities in the Nkhata Bay District which has a population of 250,000.

Providing a hand UP and not a hand out, Ripple Africa runs 8 pre-schools, supports 5 primary schools and has built a secondary school. It has also built, and runs a community library and offers adult literacy.

With the large population, there is tremendous pressure on the natural resources. They have a number of innovative and exciting environmental community projects. In forestry conservation they are conserving 150 km² of forest, and have helped communities plant 4 million trees. The charity's fish conservation project is already showing positive results. They are working with 40,000 households to provide special fuel efficient cook stoves which together save 80,000 bundles of wood every week and are much safer for women and children.

The charity has built and supports a local dispensary and runs a local disabilities rehabilitation programme.

In addition they have many overseas volunteers who get involved.

Charlie Knight (Hill Farm Lane) has worked in Malawi for this charity and will be coming to tell us about it at the 11am service on 24th January 2015.
